Superintendent's Message Dr. David Daigneault

Last month, we hosted our annual Superintendent's Breakfasts for students who have maintained a 90 or above average for all classes thus far in the 2020-2021 school year. During last year's quarantine, we resorted to a virtual ceremony to celebrate the top scorers in grades K-12, so it was great to host the students in person this year.

We held four separate breakfasts at the Red Top, Green Top, middle school, and high school. It struck me how many students attended each breakfast, how well-behaved they were, and how great they all looked. They were attentive, respectful, and dressed for the occasion. To me, that demonstrated a pride in achievement, and it was written all over the faces of these students.

A Rising Tide GHS Senior Finkley Wins STAR Student, Lindsay Callahan Awards

GHS senior Kira Finkley has captured two prestigious state honors, the STAR Student Award and the Lindy Callahan Scholar-Athlete selection.

Finkley is one of 16 seniors from across Mississippi who were selected as Lindy Callahan Scholar-Athletes for the Class of 2021.

The honorees — one boy and one girl from each of the Mississippi High School Athletic Association's (MHSAA) eight geographical districts — were chosen for their academic accomplishments as well as their participation in high school athletics and extracurricular activities. The recipients were chosen by a committee made up of MHSAA partners and school administrators.

Among her sports and activities, Finkley made notable contributions this year in fast-pitch softball, girls soccer, volleyball, and the Grenada Band's color guard.

"Balancing athletics and academics has not been an easy feat, but I am super excited to see that my hard work and perseverance have paid off," Finkley said. "I am also super proud to be able to represent the Grenada School District with such a high honor."

Each of the 16 Linday Callahan winners will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship.

Finkley was also named Grenada's STAR Student for the 2020-2021 school year by the Mississippi Economic Council (MEC) M.B. Swayze Foundation, sponsor of the Student Teacher Achievement Recognition (STAR) program. Established by the Mississippi Economic Council in 1965, the purpose of the STAR program is to recognize outstanding students & teachers in Mississippi.

STAR Students are selected on the basis of academic excellence. Both ACT scores and scholastic averages are compared to determine the school's STAR Student.

Each STAR Student is asked to designate a STAR Teacher, the teacher who has made the greatest contribution to the student's scholastic achievement.

Finkley designated Melanie Hopper as STAR teacher.

This is Hopper's second year in a row to be named a STAR teacher. (Last year's STAR Student, Alexa Simko, also named her for this honor.)

"This is my fourteenth year in the classroom, and I am incredibly humbled to have Kira choose me as a teacher who has made a positive impact on her life," Hopper said. "Kira has had amazing teachers and coaches throughout her educational experience, which makes her selection even more special to me."

Hopper said she has enjoyed having Finkley as a student for the past two years. "She is dedicated, sincere, driven, giving, and a joy to teach. Her desire to learn and question makes me be a better teacher. I know that Kira will succeed at all her future endeavors and am so grateful to have played a small part in her education."

A Return to Tradition for Class of 2021

After a year of masks, social-distancing, and limits on school activities, the GHS Class of 2021 overwhelmingly supported a measure to hold a traditional graduation this May.

Graduation will be held traditionally, almost as normal, in Charger Stadium on Friday, May 21, at 7 p.m. Seating will be limited, and masks are required to enter, but otherwise, GHS seniors will receive their diplomas as a unified class on the football field.

"I'm extremely excited to provide a traditional graduation for our seniors this year," said GHS Principal Emily Tindall. "In a larger sense, I hope this prestigious event will mark a shift toward normalcy in our school routine."

Tindall announced that each graduate will receive eight tickets for entrance. Seating will be for seating either on the home side or visitor's side, based on where they are seated on the football field.

In the event of inclement weather, Tindall said, the ceremony will be pushed back to Sat., May 22. Further instructions will be made available on social media if inclement conditions persist.

Last year's "drive-through graduation" was a fun and creative solution to mandatory quarantine in 2020, but this year, Tindall said she met with the senior class in two groups to get their feedback.

"We offered multiple scenarios, and the students overwhelmingly supported one traditional graduation," she said. "They appreciated us asking for their input, and they felt very strongly about experiencing this monumental event with their friends instead of being divided into groups."

The graduation ceremony will be livestreamed on the district's channel vimeo.com/GSDlive — for out-of-town relatives and other friends and family.

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
